

From the East

The 130th Anniversary and Rededication of Harmonia Lodge.

We witnessed the Grand Lodge of Florida walking in a procession to our alter. Harmonia Lodge Brothers and visiting Brothers gave the Most Worshipful Grand Master Glen B. Bishop and his Grand Line a Public Grand Honors.

W:. M:. TK received the M:. W:. Grand Master Glen in the East and tendered the gavel. The ceremony continued with the Grand Line officers and pro tempores sitting next to our Lodge officers in the appropriate Places and Stations. Vessels were placed on the table next to the **Lodge/Ark** in the East by the Deputy Grand Master, Sr. Grand Warden placed a vessel on the West and Jr. Grand Warden placed a vessel on the South.

The M:. W:. Grand Master began with the Consecration, asking the Grand Chaplain to lead us in Prayer. Then we hear this deep powerful voice of the M:. W:. Grand Master directing the Worshipful Grand Marshal to assemble the Harmonia Lodge Officers between the Alter and the West facing us East. I being at the Apex of this group, I could hear 16 Heartbeats behind me, pounding loud with excitement.

The Deputy Grand Master Don Cowart, proclaimed; Most Worshipful Grand Master, a number of Brethren, duly instructed in the mysteries of Masonry, and having assembled for generations for the past 130 years, by virtue of a Charter granted them on January 17th, AL 5894, AD 1894 by the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Florida, do now desire to be rededicated in celebration of their Anniversary as their forefathers did in days gone by, agreeable to the Ancient Usages and Customs of the Fraternity. Followed by the Grand Secretary reading the History of Harmonia Lodge on January 17th, 1894, indicating the names of the three Lodge officers along with the Chartering Grand Lodge Officers present that day.

The Grand Marshall then formed the Grand Lodge Officers around the **Lodge/Ark**, where one at a time the Grand Deputy Master, Grand Sr. and Jr. Deacons removed their placed vessels, afterwards the Sr and Jr Grand Stewards uncovered the **Lodge/Ark**.

The M:. W:. Grand Master stepped down from the East and over to the **Lodge/Ark** where he was handed each of the Three Vessels, the first filled with corn, the second filled with wine and the third filled with oil. As he sprinkled the contents of each into the **Lodge/Ark** comments were made about each and its purpose in the rededication ceremony. Afterwards the Grand Chaplain lead us in prayer.

The M:. W:. Grand Master rededicated Harmonia Lodge 138 by standing with stretched hands over the **Lodge/Ark** with a strong voice commemorated by saying. "To the memory of the Holy Saints John, we rededicate this Lodge. May every brother revere their characters and imitate their virtues."

After the M:. W:. Grand Master returned to the East and Reconstituted Harmonia Lodge 138 by proclaiming; In the name of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, I now rededicate and form you, my beloved Brethren, as in the days of old, into this particular Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons. From henceforth I empower you to continue to meet as a regular Lodge, rededicated in conformity to the rites of our Order and the Charges of our Ancient an Honorable Fraternity; and the Supreme Architect of the Universe prosper, direct and counsel you in all your doings! Brethren: So Mote It Be! Amen!

The M:. W: Grand Master requested the Brethren to give a congratulations to the Lodge for its rededication, afterwards many intros, thanks, and W:. M:. TK provided wages to the Grand Line in the form of a Harmonia Rededication coin.

The Lodge was closed by M:. W:. Grand Master Glen B. Bishop.

The Brothers and guests enjoyed a gourmet meal prepared by W:. Ricky and Brother JoJo. Many Thanks are given to the Brothers that helped prepare the Lodge, set up and clean up, led by W:. Ray Rios and Brother JC Rogers. (The Marines flag was brilliant) Special Thanks to Brother David Reilly for producing the program and providing the History from 1894 to present.

Special Thanks to W:. Tony Petrides and HPM David Reilly for inspiring me back in February of 2023 when I was the new Sr. Warden to consider a rededication ceremony and a coin for our 130th anniversary in 2024.

Many Thanks to all the Brothers who helped all along to make this ceremony successful and well attended. Let's sell more coins!!!

ENMI Lodge No. 1973 February Written by David J. Reilly

Enmi Lodge Meeting of January 2024, I will remind you, once upon a time in my mind I belonged to a Lodge. I had joined and attended. I did not care about the cost or the distance I needed to travel to get to the Lodge. I entered on the level, parted on the square, and was always treated on the Plumb and as an upright Mason. The fellowship is euphoric, the meetings are knowledgeable and entertaining, and the food really does not come into play except on special meetings. Members do not try to outdo one another, and ego, pettiness and daily cares are left outside. It was a joy to be with like-minded men and men whose values were held high, and we all felt a joy to be there together.

Our speakers are not necessarily members of the Lodge, simple men who are knowledgeable and provide the members of Enmi Lodge with thought that may provide reflection. Our visitor was Robert E. Lee. Just as all members and visitors to our lodge, General Lee was treated with respect, and we sat earnestly waiting for him to speak. He began speaking about his two years at West Point. He entered West Point from a recommendation from then Secretary of State, John C. Calhoun. He graduated 2nd in his class and graduated with course work in Engineering. He graduated as a Second Lt. in the Corps of Engineers. He was ordered to Tybee Georgia where he worked on the design of Ft. Pulaski. He would work on the Harbor of St Louis and be advanced in rank to 1st Lt. In 1842, as a Captain in the Union Army, he was transferred to Hort Hamilton in New York. He was married in 1831 and his wife Annie died in 1862. Lee distinguished himself in the Mexican American War (1846– 1848). He was one of Winfield Scott's chief aides in the march from Veracruz to Mexico City. During this time he worked for the first time with Ulysses S Grant in Mexico. During that time in the Army and with his engineering he revamped and made maps of Florida. In 1852, Lee was appointed Superintendent of the Military Academy at West Point. (continued next page)

In 1855, Lee was promoted to second -in-command of the 2nd Cavalry Regiment in Texas. He told of his wanting to be in the Calvary and this allowed him his wish to be in a combat command. The mission was to protect settlers from attacks by the Apache and the Comanche. While serving in the Military, Lee remained far from the political side and aloof of the issues on slavery.

Lee argued that slavery was bad for white people, claiming that he found slavery bothersome and time-consuming as an everyday institution to run. He believed Emancipation would sooner come from Christian impulse among slave masters before "storms and tempests of fiery controversy."

He told a little of Harpers Ferry and that when John Brown did not surrender on the October Morning, Lee attacked. After three minutes of fighting those that were alive surrendered. Lee believed that Brown was a Madman and had achieved temporary success through confusion and chaos.

Robert. E Lee had taken an Oath to the Union and to serve the United States. He was asked while leaving Texas by a lieutenant if he intended to fight for the Confederacy or the Union, to which Lee replied, "I shall never bear arms against the Union, but it may be necessary for me to carry a musket in the defense of my native state, Virginia, in which case I shall not prove recreant to my duty". It was not until Virginia ratified session that Robert E. Lee wrote a resignation to the US War Department. He was sound in his belief that he could not take up arms against his Virginia. In Washington that day, On May 24, 1861, presidential advisor Francis P. Blair offered Lee a role as major general to command the defense of the national capital.

He replied: "Mr. Blair, I look upon secession as anarchy. If I owned the four million of slaves in the South, I would sacrifice them all to the Union; but how can I draw my sword upon Virginia, my native state?"

On or near the outbreak of the war, April 12, 1861, Lee was appointed a Major General by the Virginia Governor, and by the outbreak was named one of the five Generals for the Confederacy. He did not get into the several battles of the War between the States. Some brothers asked about specifics, and he answered, but it was evident that General Lee was a southern gentleman, loved by his soldiers and was endeared with the nickname "Granny." He did mention the soldiers never referred to him in that way directly, but he knew the nickname. Lee was religious, and it was noted throughout his talk that he prayed even in camp. Lee was a private person, and his greeting to Command and soldiers alike were always followed with I hope you are well. His war horse was named Traveler and when asked why he named him traveler, Lee responded that the horse walked at a fast gate and was always willing to go down the road. Throughout the war years we know of Lee going down the road. He was known to be within bullet range of battles.

After Gettysburg, Shelby Foote would write that Gettysburg was the price the South paid for having Robert E Lee. Soon after the Battle of Gettysburg Lee surrendered to Grant on April 9, 1865, at the Battle of Appomattox Court House. In time after Lee would say, "So far from engaging in a war to perpetuate slavery, I am rejoiced that slavery is abolished. I believe it will be of great for the interests of the South"

BROTHER AGAINST BROTHER By W:. Tony Petrides




Decades of tension and political strife over slavery, westward expansion, and disputed lands lead to the start of the American Civil War in 1861. Our nation was wrought with divisiveness, the North and South, Union and Confederacy, vying for control while the country entered one of its darkest and most formative chapters of development. A once thriving nation, proud of the freedom, industry, and ingenuity of a new world, dissolved into war.

This fragmentation of our unified state presented an alarming struggle in Freemasonry: Brother fighting Brother. Fathers, sons, and fraternal brothers were often in opposition, still connected by the Masonic values of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth.

How did these values of light and honor in Freemasonry prevail during a time of such darkness? Historical records document countless Masonic acts of compassion, where Masons worked to ease the suffering of fellow brethren through charitable Relief, despite division. Loyalty to the craft prevailed. There are countless examples that Masons provided resources to both Masonic brothers that were allies and also enemies during the conflict.

One of my favorite stories is found in the records of a lodge in Savannah, Georgia. It is a story of how, with the Civil War raging, Confederate soldiers helped a Union Brother complete a Masonic degree. According to an article from the Georgia Masonic Messenger, shortly after the start of the war, Union soldiers captured the beaches on Hilton Head. Before long, the northerners sent a message under the white flag to the Confederate Soldiers. A Union soldier had passed through the Fellowcraft Degree before shipping out, and they wanted to see if a nearby lodge could test and raise him to a Master Mason. Within days, a detail of Confederate cavalry escorted the Fellowcraft Mason and several Master Masons of the North safely through the Confederate Lines and over 30 miles of Confederate defenses to Savannah and the local Masonic lodge. The records note that this Brother was proficient in the Fellowcraft Degree, and he was raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason. After the ritual was complete, the Confederate cavalry returned their Brothers to Hilton Head without incident. Brotherly love and Masonic Fraternal bonds trumped all, even the Civil War! Remember your obligation my Brothers.



Teddy and Booker T

A Book Review by Lodge Librarian and Historian, David J. Reilly

Teddy and Booker T is a historical account written by Brian Kilmeade. It compares a man who came from slavery, Booker T. Washington, and a man who was well to do who believed in much the same way for equality, Theodore Roosevelt. He compares the two men as they grow and come of age and what they do in getting there. Booker T. Washington struggles to make a school for Blacks and maintains the educational standards of white schools. He struggles to fund and maintain the school in Tuskegee, Alabama after slavery and during the Jim Crow years. Theodore Roosevelt is reported on his journey through History as a boy who grew up sickly and weak and he built himself. It tells of his strength in endurance and drive to become well and that drive carried him to San Juan Hill, New York Police Commissioner, New York Governor, and President of the United States. Kilmeade also brings to light the thoughts and beliefs of each man. The Author has a talent for digging into the characteristics of the men he writes about. He surrounds them with History and their beliefs. Brett Baier, author of To Rescue the Constitution said, "Kilmeade has done it again, delivering another great book about a relationship that changed our country for the better"

The author makes the book a fast paced read.

It is 303 Pages long and well worth the read.


