





To Thine Own Self Be True: *Shakespeare, Hamlet* By David J. Reilly

Several years ago, not too long ago, there was a sign in the classroom at the Lake Worth Scottish Rite that read “Know Thyself.” For several years and reunions while in the classroom I read and reread that sign and the meaning changed, or at least my reaction and thinking did. My Scottish Rite and Masonic Journey has showed me various stages of me knowing myself. Those stages have changed along my path. When I was younger, I knew everything, but as the apocryphal goes, “When I became older, I was surprised by how much I had learned.” Somewhere along the path of my Masonic journey I stopped trying to memorize the Masonic work and began concentrating on the meaning of the words. I began to peel the layers of myself working once outward to in and then inward to out. I looked at my beliefs, my weaknesses, and my strengths. I began to look into the eyes of others as to how others saw me. I began looking at myself through the virtues and tenets that Freemasonry had taught me. I thought deeply about integrity and how I exemplified or portrayed it to others. I took the time to question myself: did I truly process these Masonic Characteristics, and the other Cardinal Virtues and how I defined them. As I grow older, I still evaluate my thoughts on temperance, fortitude, prudence, and Justice. I still ask myself about my Integrity and if I am still worthy and qualified. It is not a four-hour study, but it is a thesis of the self never written never published, always a work in progress and time.

Throughout our lives sometimes we face philosophical questions; Who am I, Why Am I here, What Am I supposed to be doing, and Where Am I going, and What happens at the end of my life? Writers have spent years authoring books to answer these questions Shelves in bookstores and book sales online under “Self Help” are countless. Each self is his or her own, and there is not one answer for each question, the answers are found from within yourself and Knowing Thyself. More self-evaluation, self-examination, time, and revisitation of the self.




To Thine Own Self Be True: *Shakespeare, Hamlet* (Continued)

Examinees are fortunate to keep interested and in finding answers. In time with the help of mentors, one continues to chip the rough Ashlar. While Knowing Thyself is also a part of learning, knowledge, and wisdom, finding the questions, discovering the answers, applying the questions and answers then being able to mentor the findings to others are a part of the learning and growing.

Sometime in the Autumn of one's life the trials begin, and mortality becomes a part of Knowing Thyself and becomes a reality. When searching leads to mentoring, either by others or yourself, another term arises, Replace Yourself. This concept is difficult to comprehend. It is difficult to us to replace ourselves in life. It does not mean we are finished, and we no longer live. It is preparation and a time to replace yourself in a job or career that we have built, climbed, and made a success. It is a time to search for other opportunities to reflect again, to do a self-check once again as in preparation and qualification of our lives. In many, we ask the question, Am I leaving a mark in this world? In reflection you will find many self-triumphs, however it will take reflection as to which ones are important to you. Is it the financial gifts, the corporate moment of definition, the Fraternal or Civic club that you gave of yourself, or your affiliation with the church? It might include the time you gave personally to your fellowman, the poor, the destitute, the hungry or homeless.

It is of Masonic importance that as a Lodge Leader, whether administratively, serving in the lodge as a committee person or working in degrees that you look at new members and find those who have talent and interest that can and will replace you. This is an unselfish act with no place for ego knowing that new members will make the Lodge grow long after we are gone.

Using Knowledge and Wisdom as it influences others while unselfishly you mentor others will allow you to reach an unanticipated euphoria tending to the instruction and encouragement of the Lodge and others to step in and lead.

Stepping aside for others does not mean stepping out. Nor is it a cause for exit, as the mentor observes, finds other avenues of need, listens with an attentive ear and speaks with an instructive tongue. The mentor must comprehend the need and be able to draw on himself when to listen, when to speak, when to comfort and when to correct. It is part of the Masonic Journey of change as well for the mentor. "If wisdoms way you wisely seek, five things observe with care, know to whom you speak, of what you speak, and how, and when and where"

In Freemasonry the learning never ceases. Participation is not just attending a business meeting. It is the instruction of the brothers, the teaching in the degrees, the mentoring of the words, kitchen assistance, taking part in events and remembering your obligation. These are all vehicles for all of us to participate and interact. The interaction aides in Knowing Thyself, example is the operative action of Replacing Yourself. To issue these commodities without ego involvement but with integrity, charity and industriousness, the giving of oneself is a milestone for Knowing Thyself.

Alas My Brother

The phrase, “Alas My Brother”, has intrigued me since I first heard it at a Masonic Funeral. I recall as a child going to a Masonic Service and seeing all the men lined up in their aprons with coat and tie and they gave their respects and in a low breath each said “Alas My Brother” individually. I will start this piece with the disclaimer that all of Freemasonry is to be found on a Mason’s Journey and is to be interpreted by the Mason himself. This writing is written as I have found it, researched it, and written it. I will give some explanation where it is found in the Bible, Kings 1 13-30, and a brief synopsis of the Bible story which I suggest it be read in full. The Pronunciation of “Alas My Brother”, and where it is used in Freemasonry, and some translations from other languages will be discussed.

So many times in Freemasonry, we look at a part of the Bible, sometimes knowing it is part of the Bible, and sometimes memorizing out of context not knowing what or what the passage refers to. To that I say when you find a verse with Masonic meaning, the true or more meaning may be found in the chapter or even in the book of the Bible. There is a difference in the commentaries of the Bible between a Man of God and a Prophet, while both may be used interchangeably. A Man of God is chosen and given a missal from God to the man. A prophet may be a holy man, who has accepted certain teachings and professes to teach to others.

“Alas My Brother” is found in Kings 1 13-30. It is a story of when King David is dying, and King Solomon is in line to become King of Israel. Israel has been split north and south, and idol worship has been introduced to the people of Israel and idol worship has begun.

Alas My Brother (continued)

God has sent a man of God to the King to correct this error, and during the visit the king catches the altar as it is falling and burns his hand. He pleads with the Man of God to heal him, and the Man of God does this. The King invites the Man of God to return with him for rest and refreshment, but the man of God tells the King that he is not to rest or refresh himself in the land by commandment of God. The Man of God begins his return trip and a man in the town hears of this story and goes to meet the Man of God on the Road. He tells the Man of God he is a Prophet, and he should return with him to rest and refresh himself. The Man of God does. He eats with the man and refreshes himself and thus begins his journey. He meets a lion on the road and the lion kills the Man of God. The “prophet” goes and gets him. The “Prophet sees him and lays the deceased in his own grave and in mourning says, “Alas My Brother.”

In Freemasonry, this phrase is heard at a Masonic Funeral. At the end of the service a sprig of Acacia is placed on the Brother's Apron or Coffin and the Mason who placed it is heard to say in low breath, “Alas My Brother.” The term should be pronounced (uh-las) Alas, should be pronounced on an intake breath and my brother should be pronounced on an exhale breath.

(Alas My Brother) Alas is an expression of grief, pity, or concern. There is so much more in the use of this phrase at a Masonic Funeral. In Freemasonry we are to make Masons and bury Masons. When a petition comes to the Lodge, we are to act on it with proper diligence, we are to protect our West Gate by learning as much as we can about the petitioner, we are to investigate him thoroughly, doing a background check and even meeting his family.

Alas My Brother (continued)

The Lodge votes and he is elected to receive the degrees by a unanimous vote. During his journey in Freemasonry the initiate is mentored and shares in education of freemasonry and fellowship. He is our Brother. When his journey in Freemasonry is over and he passes to the Celestial Lodge above, We, his Brothers may be requested to come and participate in a Masonic Funeral Service. At the end of the service it is customary that we say, "Alas My Brother." The phrase is said in so many languages, so many jurisdictions, in many countries by men who are Masons from all over the world. We the living are expected to reminisce on the deceased life of our Brother. As Masons did, we offer truth, relief, and brotherly love to all members of the craft, and did we carry those principal tenets into the world? Did we represent Freemasonry as a Beacon for others to aspire to, and to find hope, faith, and love. Being a Mason is work. Freemasonry is work. As Masons we are leaders in our Masonic Teachings, but have we mentored, have we come to the aid of this Brother or others when help was needed? Do we look and listen for other Brothers to share loyalty, integrity, and brotherly love?

As we bid farewell to a deceased brother, do we ponder and examine ourselves? Did we know him as a true and loyal Mason, and at the same time are we true and loyal Masons? Do we look at this child of God as the Prophet did in the Kings 1 story and say, "Alas My Brother", we have made a Mason and we have buried a brother?


