# Masonic Symbols

In this article, an investigation will be made on some Masonic symbols, the Cable-Tow, the Steritt, the Chisel and the Pencil. We as masons and non-masons alike have been introduced to the Cable-Tow. The operative term, cable-tow is found in nautical terms (1555) as 608 feet, approximately 200 yards. It has been a nautical tow rope, which has towed other ships, and targets, as in the movie *The Caine Mutiny*. In speculative terms, we learn that a cable-tow is a space that is a distance or boundary a mason or man will extend himself to assist others. In masonry, it is defined as a Masonic term. In Hebrew (Ezekiel 18:7) it is his Pledge. A pledge of a life of a man or vow. From the Square Magazine 2021, Cable-Tow is referenced in German as “Kabel tauw”. By Masonic authors, Cable-Tow has been defined as 15 ½ miles, the distance between the Temple and the Quarry. Cable-Tow has also been defined as 15 inches, the distance between tip of tongue and the heart.

The Steritt is a measuring tool which is a line of string or cord wrapped around a spool and stick. It is used to layout the boundaries of a foundation and building. This tool is not a tool used in Masonry throughout the World. It is found in Foreign Lodges, and speculatively shows a man a straight line. A pathway that he should not deter from, in setting his personal boundaries or path. Interesting not being taught the use of this tool, I can understand the significance of it. To follow a straight line, to set my own foundation yet being able to retrieve it to avoid mishaps and to make a better path to set my own temple.

The Chisel is an operative tool found in other masonry as well as Co-Masonry. It is used to make a finer fit, a place to cut the stone or carve decorations into the stone. The chisel would work with the common gavel in smoothing the stone. In speculative freemasonry, the chisel would be that added tool that would finish an Ashlar, bringing it to perfection, another source to make the heart of man complete, and enabling the teachings of Freemasonry to not only be proficient, but to strive to perfection.

The Pencil is another tool chosen by foreign lodges. An operative tool that works in conjunction with the 24-inch gauge, to mark the measurement of the cuts on the stone. Without measuring and marking there would be no continuity in the parts of the building. Speculatively the pencil suggests importance in the building of our own temple. To plan, draw, to erase and redraft what we would like ourselves to replicate. It is also a reminder of our obligation in not communicating Freemasonry to the profane.

While these thoughts and explanations may or may not be complete in their explanation, it is for the individual to build his own temple and to search for truth and knowledge. These writings as I have said many times do not answer specifics but are to enlighten and make the Knowledgeable Mason think.

# Parting of the Ways

The 1956 marker at False Parting of the Ways, on Wyoming Highway 28 southwest of South Pass, incorrectly states that it was here the trails diverged. (Wyoming SHPO)

I was reminded about a term, Parting of the Ways. I was thinking how it came to be in my life, as my Family moved from Indiana to Ohio, back to Indiana and then me moving to Florida. The Parting of friends, memories and even my mother Lodge in Indiana.

I have read about the Oregon Trail, and along the trail where the trail breaks off to continue to California. The place is known as the Parting of the Ways. From Wyoming History we find the location, "About 18 miles after travelers on the Oregon Trail crossed the Continental Divide at South Pass, they reached a junction known now as the Parting of the Ways. The right fork went west toward Fort Hall in present southern Idaho, while the left continued southwest toward Fort Bridger and Salt Lake City."

In reading this and understanding that families who became friends reached this point and went separate ways, these families had grown close since leaving St Joseph. They had been through accidents, weather, sickness and even death along the way. They had shared food, taken care of each other's children, celebrated, and cried together. On reaching this point the goals and family direction would succumb, and they would part the way.

I was reminded from the reading how I had read about the Great Wagon Road leaving Philadelphia and journeying to South Carolina through Winchester Va, Roanoke Va. into South Carolina, and Georgia. The Parting of the ways came to these people also as they left Philadelphia and joined wagon trains, sharing parts of wagons as parts broke along the trail, sharing food, taking care of the sick and burying the dead along the way. These trails were not the highways we have today as 40 miles might take 2 or 3 days depending on the conditions. Even the slightest sickness could lead to death. Families and friends would make strong bonds along the way. They would part in Winchester as some went west to Ohio and Indiana, more would part at Big Lick or Roanoke as others took the Wilderness Road to the Cumberland trail through the Cumberland Gap to Tennessee and Kentucky.

# Parting of the Ways (continued)

Further South the Fall Line Road would take pioneers west through Indian Country to Alabama. Travelers needed to have a permit to take this route, and it was governed by the Indians. (Ref. Two Sacks) Up till now we have looked at the parting of the ways. There is one other story that falls into the Parting of the Ways. The time is just prior to the Civil War. A group of soldiers who attended West Point Military Academy would find themselves parting ways. Stationed in California, the parting of the ways came for Lou Armistead and Winfred Hancock as they parted in California as one would fight for his beloved Virginia and one would wear Blue. At the Parting Armistead said, "Recalling a misty-eyed farewell in California before the two men set off for war, Armistead quoted himself as saying, "[Winfield], so help me, if I ever raise my hand against you, may God strike me dead." Tears flowed profusely. They would meet on the field of battle in Gettysburg and while friends had parted in California both men had been injured at Gettysburg day three. General Armistead had made his advancement to Cemetery Ridge during Pickett's charge. He would be fatally wounded. Hancock had been wounded, but was taken to the field hospital and recovered. General Lou Armistead would lie and be found by Union Army Captain Henry H. Bingham, and would die, however the story goes he spoke of General Hancock and lamented about his wound. The incident became a monument in Gettysburg "Friend to Friend" and both men were Freemasons.

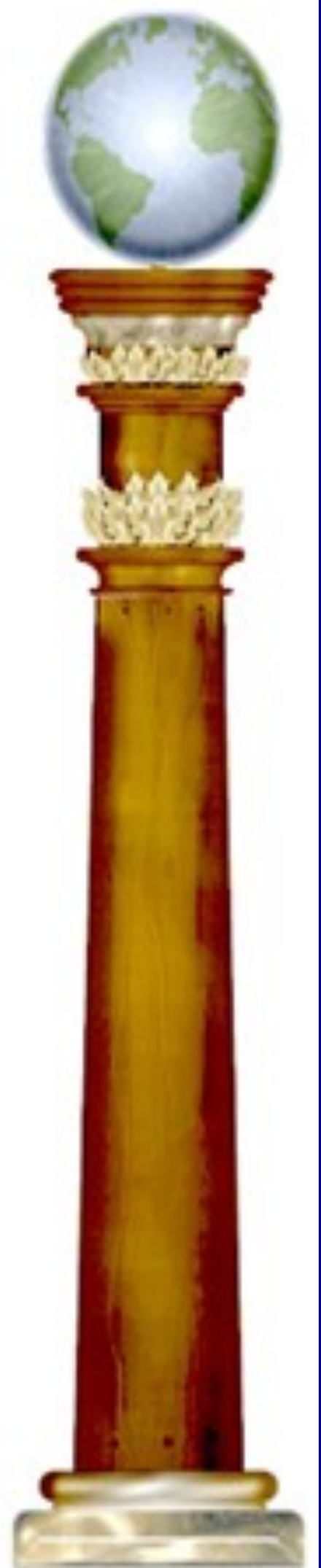
There is more in parting of the ways as in death of family, friends and leaving behind the mortal, but grasping the memories of lives past. We as Masons prepare for the inevitable, we do not welcome it, but we prepare for it, and throughout life we are reminded to be prepared. As we part ways from this life, we look for the promise of anew, and possibly the rejoining of those we have parted from. Forever to "Meet upon the Level and Part upon the Square".

## *Instructive Tongue*

There are two brazen pillars placed before the entrance to King Solomon's Temple which are symbolically represented within every Lodge in the Second Degree of Masonry. No one can determine the origin of this practice. It existed in ancient times and the great Temple at Jerusalem was one of the many examples. It has been said that the Pillars of Hercules inspired the columns antedating their place in history. These natural rock formations at Gibraltar and Cueta stand guard over the Strait of Gibraltar and mark the end of the western world as ancients knew it.



In Freemasonry these pillars bear the names Boaz and Jachin and are symbols of strength and establishment, and by implication, of power and control. In passing between them, the Fellow Craft is not told to observe or examine one at the expense of the other. Both power and control are placed before him so that he might realize power without control is anarchy or that control without power is futility. These two pillars of strength and establishment, of power and control, suggest that man must have both if in his life if he is to be successful.
