The Barefoot Mailman

It is important that we as Freemasons in West Palm Beach and from Harmonia Lodge No.138 remember the stories and the routes of the Barefoot Mailman as the routes were walked just 9 years prior to our Lodge and continued to just 2 years before the chartering of our Lodge. The Star Route was carried by the barefoot mailman from West Palm Beach to Miami. The round trip took 6 days and covered 138 miles. On the 7th day the carrier rested, and then the next day he started all over again. Prior to the Barefoot Mailman, it took a letter 3 months to reach West Palm Beach, as it would be taken to Key West by boat, then to Havana, then New York, and then back to Titusville where it would be brought to the Palm Beaches by boat. There were no roads. There was a total of 11 Carriers during this time period. They needed to be in good physical shape, able to swim, and know a little about the outdoors, camping, and fishing. Carriers would need to weather hot sun, torrential rains and storms, mosquitoes, No-see-Ems, poisonous snakes, alligators, panthers and bears. The salary was \$600.00 annually and sometimes they would take someone traveling north or south and get an extra \$10.00 for guide service.

A typical trip began on Monday from Palm Beach in a small boat down Lake Worth to the Boynton Inlet. The carrier would walk 5 miles and spend the first night at the Orange Grove Refuge House in Delray which had been built for shipwrecked sailors. Tuesday the carrier would walk 7 miles to the Hillsboro Inlet, cross in a small boat that was there for that purpose and was kept hidden, continue walking for 18 miles to Ft. Lauderdale and spend another night at the New River House of refuge. Eleven houses of Refuge had been built on the coast for shipwrecked sailors. On Wednesday he would row 4 miles down the New River to the inlet, walk 4 miles to the top of Key Biscayne, and if conditions were right, he would sail, if not he would row and reach Miami Wednesday Night. Thursday he would start the trip north and return to Palm Beach Saturday night. In total he would travel 80 miles on foot, and 56 miles by boat. To prevent fatigue, the carriers developed a peculiar walk on the hard packed sand near the water's edge. Heading South, the right foot moved more quickly than the left, Heading North the left foot moved more quickly. They would tie their shoes together and carry them over their shoulder along with a lightweight canvas mailbag used just by the Barefoot Mailmen. They also carried a small haversack which held hard biscuits, salt pork, a small frying pan, coffee, a tin cup and some matches. They would supplement their diets with fish, small animals, wild oranges, bananas, and occasionally turtle eggs. Grape leaves made fine dishes along the way. In 1887, October 9th, on a Sunday, 35-year-old James H. Hamilton, Star Route Carrier from Trigs County Kentucky was not feeling well and someone mentioned he should delay his trip. He took a bottle of Perry-Davis Pain Killer with him and started his route on time. He never reached the first stop, the Orange Grove House of Refuge. It was reported a week later he had never reached it. His clothes and Mail Bag were found hanging from a tree near where the boat was hidden. The boat was gone, and his underclothes were found on the ground near the waters. There were rumors of hunters in the area. Some believe that he found the boat missing and swam across and was never heard of. His friends found a jawbone with a gold filling and concluded James had been eaten by Alligators.

The Barefoot Mailman route continued until a crude road was built below Palm Beach to Miami in 1893. This allowed mail to be carried overland by road. The Flagler Railroad would be in service in just a few years. Now in modern days, we see in the news that the UPS trucks are getting Air conditioning and many paid vacation days!



How the Apostles Died

Names of the 12 disciples of Jesus Christ:

1. Simon (also known as Peter) was crucified upside down on an x shaped cross. According to church tradition it was because he told his tormentors that he felt unworthy to die in the same way that Jesus Christ had died.
2. Andrew (Peter's brother) He was crucified on an x-shaped cross in Patras, Greece. After being whipped severely by seven soldiers, they tied his body to the cross with cords to prolong his agony. His followers reported that, when he was led toward the cross, Andrew saluted it in these words, "I have long desired and expected this happy hour. The cross has been consecrated by the body of Christ hanging on it". He continued to preach to his tormentors for two days until he expired.
3. James (son of Zebedee and John's brother) The leader of the church in Jerusalem, was thrown over a hundred feet down from the southeast pinnacle of the Temple when he refused to deny his faith in Christ. When they discovered that he survived the fall, his enemies beat James to death with a fuller's club. This was the same pinnacle where Satan had taken Jesus during the Temptation.
4. John (son of Zebedee and James' brother) John faced martyrdom when he was boiled in a huge Basin of boiling oil during a wave of persecution in Rome. However, he was miraculously delivered from death. John was then sentenced to the mines on the prison island of Patmos. He authored his prophetic Book of Revelation on Patmos. The apostle John was later freed and returned to serve as Bishop of Edessa in modern Turkey. He died as an old man, the only apostle to die peacefully.
5. Bartholomew (friend of Philip; the Gospel of John refers to him as Nathanael) Bartholomew was also known as Nathaniel. He was a missionary to Asia. He witnessed for our Lord in present day Turkey. Bartholomew was martyred for his preaching in Armenia where he was flayed to death by a whip.
6. Thomas (also called "Didymus" (lit. "twin"), a Greek calque of his Hebrew name) Thomas was stabbed with a spear in India during one of his missionary trips to establish the church in the Subcontinent.
7. James (son of Alphaeus to distinguish him from James's son of Zebedee) James, the Son of Zebedee was a fisher by trade when Jesus called him to a lifetime of ministry. As a strong leader of the church, James was beheaded at Jerusalem. The Roman officer who guarded James watched amazed as James defended his faith at his trial. Later, the officer walked beside James to the place of execution. Overcome by conviction, he declared his new faith to the judge and knelt beside James to accept beheading as a Christian.
8. Judas Iscariot (son of Simon Iscariot; the characterization "Iscariot" is used to distinguish him from Jude the Apostle) Hung himself, after betraying Jesus.
Matthias. Matthias traveled widely to bring the Gospel message to all peoples. He is said to have spread the word in Cappadocia, the Caspian Sea, and to have journeyed as far as Ethiopia. The apostle was chosen to replace the traitor Judas Iscariot. He was stoned and then beheaded.
9. Simon the Canaanite. Simon the Cananaean, touched countless hearts with his tireless ministry. Through him, people witnessed the love of God, made manifest in his words and deeds. Crucified.
10. Mathew, He had been a tax collector and the first to have called "Follow Me" He witnessed and taught the teachings of Jesus. Was he a martyr, meeting a dramatic end in a foreign land? His death is not told in the Bible.
11. Phillip His evangelistic endeavors, particularly in Phrygia, drew not only followers but also the ire of those aggrieved by the rapid spread of the Christian faith. Martyrdom Crucified Upside down.
12. Jude recorded that his path led him to Edessa, a city nestled within the ancient realm of Mesopotamia. Crucified.
